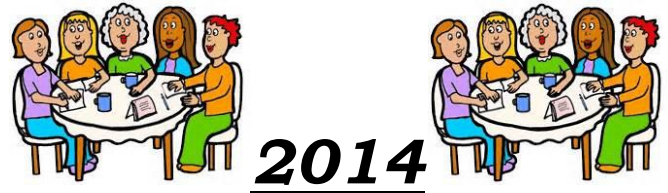

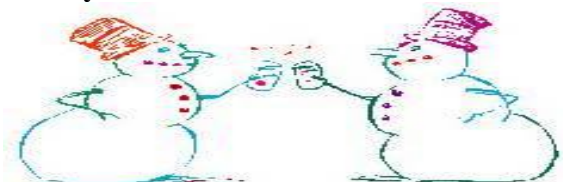

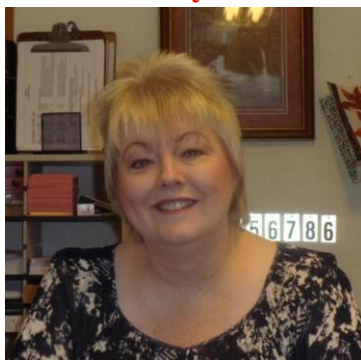

As his name is **Pappy**, I asked about grandchildren. His answer floored me. He has 23, has raised several of them and currently has a 20-month angel living at his house most of the time! 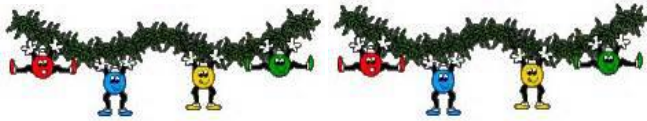

PEANUT BUTTER REESE'S

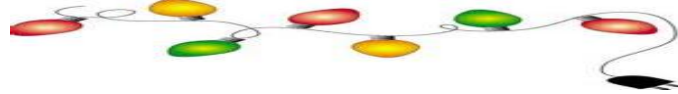
Alice

1 cup white sugar	1 cup brown sugar
1 ½ cup peanut butter	1 cup shortening
2 eggs, beaten lightly	2 ½ cups sifted flour
2 teaspoon soda	1 teaspoon vanilla
Pinch salt	

Cream sugar, shortening, and peanut butter. Add eggs, then flour & soda sifted together. Roll into small balls and put in a mini baking cup. Bake at 350 degrees for approximately 12 minutes.

While cookies are baking unwrap Reese's miniature candy. As soon as the cookies are done insert a Reese's cup into the middle of the cookie.

It is not necessary to have a mini muffin pan. Place the mini baking cups on a baking sheet and it will work fine.



Peppermint Bark

Kay

2 pounds white chocolate chips
1/2 pound peppermint candies

Line a baking pan with foil. Coat with nonstick cooking spray.

Place candies in a quart-size resealable plastic bag. Place bag inside a gallon-size resealable bag. Crush with a meat mallet or heavy saucepan.

Place chocolate chips in a large glass bowl. Microwave at 60% power for 1 minute. Stir. Repeat, stirring until smooth. Fold half the crushed candies into the melted chocolate. Pour onto prepared pan, spreading almost to edge of pan. Sprinkle top with remaining crushed candies. Refrigerate until firm, about an hour. Break apart into bite-size pieces.



Crinkle top Cookies

1 1/2 cups lard	2 cups white sugar
3 eggs	8 Tbls. molasses
4 tsp. soda	1 tsp. salt
2 tsp. ginger, cinnamon	6 cups flour

Roll in balls, dip in sugar, place on cookie sheet. Bake 12 minutes, 375 degrees. Or place on floured board, add more flour, roll out and make ginger bread men!!

NO BAKE OATMEAL COOKIES

2 cups Sugar	4 Tbs Cocoa
1 stick Butter	1 cup Peanut Butter
1 Tbs Vanilla	3 cups Oatmeal

Waxed paper or parchment paper

In a heavy sauce pan bring to boil, the sugar, cocoa, butter, & milk. Let boil for 1 minute, then add peanut butter, vanilla and oatmeal. On waxed or parchment paper drop mixture by the teaspoonful until cooled and hardened.



HIDDEN KISS COOKIE

Alice

2 ¼ cups of all-purpose flour	1 cup sliced almonds
2/3 cup powdered sugar	½ tsp. table salt
1 ¼ cups butter, softened	1 tsp. vanilla extract
¼ tsp. almond extract	42 chocolate kisses

Preheat oven to 350. Pulse first 4 ingredients in a food processor until almonds are finely ground. Beat butter together with vanilla extract and almond extract at medium high speed with an electric mixer about 30 seconds or until creamy. Add flour mixture in two batches, beating until blended after each addition. Turn dough out onto a lightly floured surface, and knead 4 to 5 times. Divide dough in half. Working with one dough portion, drop by heaping teaspoons 1 inch apart on 2 parchment paper-lined baking sheets. Press 1 chocolate kiss into center of each cookie. Working with remaining dough portion, cover each chocolate with another heaping teaspoon of dough. Pinch top and bottom edges of dough together to seal. Bake at 350 for 15 minutes, placing 1 baking sheet on middle oven rack and 1 sheet on the lower oven rack. Rotate pans front to back and top rack to bottom rack. Bake 3 to 5 more minutes or until edges of cookies just begin to brown. Cool cookies on parchment paper on wire racks 10 minutes. Sprinkle with additional powder sugar.



BOURBON BALLS

Alice

1 (12-oz) package vanilla wafers, finely crushed
1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts
¾ cup powdered sugar
2 tablespoons cocoa
2 ½ tablespoons light corn syrup
½ cup bourbon
Powdered sugar

Combine vanilla wafers, nuts, powdered sugar, and cocoa in large bowl and set aside. Combine corn syrup and bourbon stirring well. Pour bourbon mixture over wafer mixture and stir until blended. Shape into 1-inch balls; roll in additional powdered sugar. Store in an airtight container up to 2 weeks.

The "W" in Christmas - Author Unknown

Each December, I vowed to make Christmas a calm and peaceful experience. I had cut back on nonessential obligations -- extensive card writing, endless baking, decorating, and even overspending. Yet still, I found myself exhausted, unable to appreciate the precious family moments, and of course, the true meaning of Christmas.

My son, Nicholas, was in kindergarten that year. It was an exciting season for a six-year-old. For weeks, he'd been memorizing songs for his school's "Winter Pageant."

I didn't have the heart to tell him I'd be working the night of the production. Unwilling to miss his shining moment, I spoke with his teacher. She assured me there'd be a dress rehearsal the morning of the presentation. All parents unable to attend that evening were welcome to come then. Fortunately, Nicholas seemed happy with the compromise.

So, the morning of the dress rehearsal, I filed in ten minutes early, found a spot on the cafeteria floor and sat down. Around the room, I saw several other parents quietly scampering to their seats. As I waited, the students were led into the room. Each class, accompanied by their teacher, sat cross-legged on the floor. Then, each group, one by one, rose to perform their song.

Because the public school system had long stopped referring to the holiday as Christmas," I didn't expect anything other than fun, commercial entertainment - songs of reindeer, Santa Claus, snowflakes and good cheer. So, when my son's class rose to sing, "Christmas Love," I was slightly taken aback by its bold title.

Nicholas was aglow, as were all of his classmates, adorned in fuzzy mittens, red sweaters, and bright snowcaps upon their heads. Those in the front row-center stage -- held up large letters, one by one, to spell out the title of the song. As the class would sing "C is for Christmas," a child would hold up the letter C. Then, "H is for Happy," and on and on, until each child holding up his portion had presented the complete message, "Christmas Love."

The performance was going smoothly, until suddenly, we noticed her; a small, quiet, girl in the front row

holding the letter "M" upside down -- totally unaware her letter "M" appeared as a "W."

The audience of 1st through 6th graders snickered at this little one's mistake. But she had no idea they were laughing at her, so she stood tall, proudly holding her "W." Although many teachers tried to shush the children, the laughter continued until the last letter was raised, and we all saw it together. A hush came over the audience and eyes began to widen. In that instant, we understood the reason we were there, why we celebrated the holiday in the first place, why even in the chaos, there was a purpose for our festivities.

For when the last letter was held high, the message read loud and clear:
